Early Education and Care in Medford

- According to the 2000 Census, 66.8% of preschool-aged children (3-4yrs) in Medford are enrolled in a formal early education program.
- According to the Departments of Early Education and Care (EEC) and Elementary and Secondary Education, Medford has three public school preschool programs, 11 licensed center-based programs and 40 licensed family child care providers.
- In February 2009, 154 eligible children were on a waiting list to receive a child care subsidy from EEC and 28 were of preschool-age (2.9-5yrs).
- EEC estimates that 237 of Medford's jobs are supported by the early education and care industry.
- The average salary of a preschool teacher in the Boston Metropolitan Area is \$32,100, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

Early Education Grant Programs in Medford

Universal Pre-Kindergarten (UPK) grants:

- UPK Classroom Quality grant funding has been awarded to one qualified family child care provider in Medford.
- In FY09, Assessment Planning grant funding was awarded to Child Development Center in Medford.

Full-Day Kindergarten grants:

- In FY09, Medford Public Schools received Quality grant funding to support 19 full-day kindergarten classrooms.
